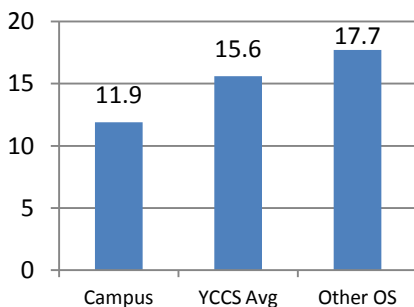

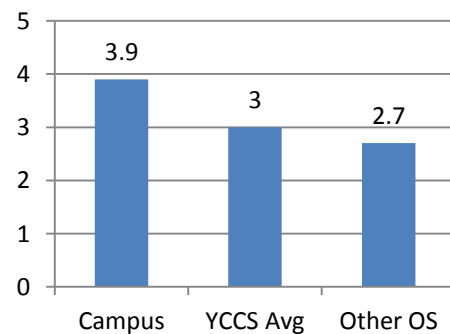

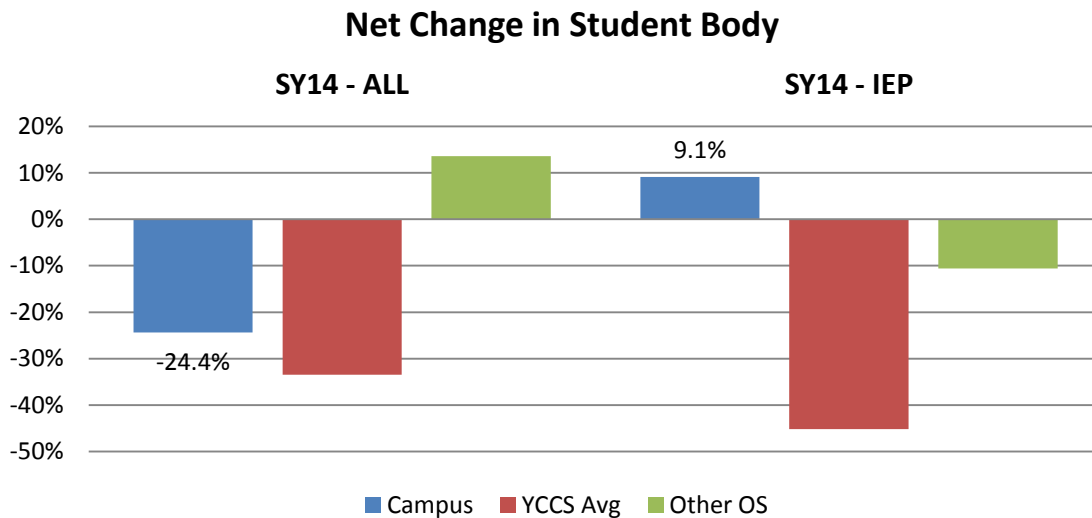
Test results for Students with Disabilities
